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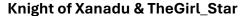

The History of Afternoon Tea

Understanding the Roots of Ritual, Refinement, and Global Influence

Tea has traveled across continents and centuries, transforming from a medicinal herb to one of the world's most beloved rituals. To appreciate Afternoon T.E.A.S.e as an act of service and elegance, it helps to understand where the tradition began—and how it evolved into the refined social custom we know today.

Tea in Ancient China

Early Use (2700 BCE – 3rd Century CE)

According to Chinese legend, tea was discovered around **2700 BCE** when leaves from a wild tea tree drifted into a pot of boiling water.

In its earliest use, tea was:

- A medicinal drink
- Prepared by boiling leaves in water
- Valued for its healing, cooling, and energizing properties

From Medicine to Daily Drink (3rd Century CE onward)

By the 3rd century, tea cultivation and processing techniques began to develop. As tea became easier to produce, it shifted from a medicinal remedy to a **daily beverage enjoyed by the public**.

The Tang Dynasty (618–906 CE)

The Tang Dynasty is considered the golden age of early tea culture. During this time:

- Tea became China's national drink
- Tea houses flourished
- Poetry, art, and literature celebrated the beauty of tea
- Early forms of tea ceremonies emerged



The Spread to Japan

Buddhist monks introduced Chinese tea to Japan, where it eventually developed into the formalized **Japanese Tea Ceremony**. A ritual emphasizing presence, harmony, and respect.

Tea Begins Its Global Journey

Tea arrived in Europe in **1570**, carried along dangerous, months-long trade routes from Asia. At that time, tea was:

- Astoundingly rare
- Expensive beyond imagination
- Reserved for royalty, nobles, and the ultra-wealthy

If someone in Europe tasted tea in the late 1500s, they were among the most privileged people in the world.

Tea was served in **tiny amounts**, presented in **delicate miniature cups**, offering only the smallest sip of this treasured import.

Why the Pinkie Stuck Out

Those early European teacups were tiny bowls with no handles. To balance the cup:

- Drinkers often extended a finger for support
- This extended pinkie later became associated with "fancy" tea drinking even though it was originally just practical

But as global trade expanded:

- Tea became more available
- Cups grew larger
- Tea storage improved
- The drink became more accessible beyond the nobility

The Birth of the Teacup Handle

In the region now known as **Germany**, the Saxons solved a major problem: Larger cups filled with hot tea were too hot to hold without burning one's fingers.

Their invention? The modern teacup handle.

Once the handle became standard:

- The pinkie was no longer needed for balance
- Proper tea etiquette shifted
- The "pinkie out" gesture vanished

To this day, we do *not* extend the pinkie—whether at afternoon tea or during formal dining.

Tea in the Americas

Tea arrived in the Americas with **the Dutch in the 17th century** and quickly became a symbol of refinement in wealthy households. From colonial salons to elegant parlors, tea became part of social gatherings, hospitality rituals, and cultural identity.
